

Helen Keller Leadership Award



Helen Keller is recognized as a person who overcame her disabilities to become a world-famous speaker, author and advocate for people with disabilities.

At 19 months, Keller contracted an unknown illness that left her both deaf and blind. After her mother was advised to contact the Perkins Institute for the Blind, then located in South Boston, she was introduced to Anne Sullivan, who became instructor and companion until her death in 1936.

In 1888, Keller started attending the Perkins Institute for the Blind. Helen's Boston connections continued when she studied at the Horace Mann School for the Deaf, located in Alston. In 1900, Helen was admitted to Radcliffe College and graduated Phi Beta Kappa, becoming the first deaf-blind person to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Helen is remembered as an advocate for people with disabilities. ***She was a board advisor for CWS for many years.*** Helen was dedicated to helping women and those with disabilities become economically self-sufficient through advocating for training that would result in jobs. In 1915, she and George A. Kessler founded Helen Keller International (HKI), devoted to research in vision, health and nutrition. In 1920, she helped to found the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU).

Martin Walsh

Recipient of the Helen Keller Leadership Award



Martin J. Walsh is Boston's 54th mayor, and was sworn in to serve a second term on January 1, 2018.

CWS is honoring Mayor Walsh for his commitment to ensure that every Bostonian has a fair opportunity at a good job, affordable housing, and a great education. As part of his interest in helping those facing barriers to economic well-being, the Mayor has visited CWS and spent time with our staff and participants.

Mayor Walsh established the nation's first municipal Office of Recovery Services to prevent and treat substance abuse. He created a program that has become a model for increasing diversity in the workplace and providing good career opportunities for women and people of color.

He was born and raised in Dorchester by immigrant parents. His recovery from alcoholism as a young adult led to his lifelong commitment to the prevention and treatment of addiction. As a full-time legislator, he returned to school earning a degree in Political Science at Boston College.

Mayor Walsh continues to reside in Dorchester with longtime partner Lorrie Higgins.

Annie Fields Founder's Award



Annie Fields lived at the center of the literary world while following her heart to help working women. Annie was a founder of CWS over 140 years ago. She was a transitional figure in the development of a professional social-service network to improve the lives of the city's poor.

Fields believed that access to high-quality education and employment opportunities was the most critical way she could improve the lives of those in poverty. She sought to apply business principles and efficiency to this mission.

She has been called a "conservative feminist," for she continued to plan and host dinners and gatherings for the leading writers, while befriending, admiring and supporting women who were making a difference in the world.

Annie was also a philanthropist and social reformer. In addition to her work with CWS, she founded the Holly Tree Inns, coffeehouses serving inexpensive and nutritious meals, and the Lincoln Street Home, a safe and inexpensive residence for unmarried working women. These institutions operated as non-profits, where milliners, shop-girls, and working women could live and receive inexpensive meals.

Paul Davis

Recipient of the Annie Fields Founder's Award



Paul R. Davis, CFA, CIC, is the founder, Managing Member and Chief Investment Officer for Marble Harbor Investment Counsel.

CWS is honoring Mr. Davis for his steadfast support of CWS and its mission. He is Chairman of the CWS Board of Directors and provides ongoing guidance and support for our staff. Mr. Davis has also served with distinction on the The Fedcap Group Board of Directors – CWS' parent organization.

Mr. Davis has managed portfolios for families and institutions for more than 25 years. Before embarking on a career in investment management, he was a strategy consultant with Monitor Company in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Mr. Davis graduated from Dartmouth with an A.B. in Government and from the Graduate School of Business Administration at Harvard with an M.B.A. He is a Chartered Financial Analyst, a Chartered Investment Counselor and a member of the Boston Economic Club.

Mr. Davis enjoys competitive sailing, travel with his wife and children, reading and skiing.

Amy Latimer

Recipient of the President's Lifetime Achievement Award



Amy Latimer is president of TD Garden. She was part of TD Garden's inaugural executive team in 1995, and after successive leadership roles, she became president in 2012.

CWS is honoring Ms. Latimer for her commitment to using CWS's business services, which have provided job experience to individuals with barriers to employment. Under her leadership, TD Garden is CWS' primary business partners – directly hiring individuals from our training programs.

Ms. Latimer serves as the executive director of the arena's philanthropic arm, Garden Neighborhood Charities. In addition, she serves on the Salvation Army of Massachusetts State advisory board, the MIAA Educational Athletic advisory board, The Special Olympics of MA advisory board, Good Sports Inc. board of directors and the Shooting Touch board of directors.

A native of Ellicott City, Maryland, Ms. Latimer received a degree in political science from the University of Rhode Island, where she attended on a full basketball scholarship. She currently resides in Topsfield, Mass., with her husband, Jody, and their three sons.

Joseph E. Finn

Recipient of the Public Service Award



Joseph E. Finn is the Boston Fire Commissioner and Chief of Department.

CWS is honoring Commissioner Finn for his leadership in ensuring that the contribution that first responders make to the quality of life of individuals with disabilities remains part of the Department's mission.

In his 33-year career with the Boston Fire Department, Commissioner Finn has served as Deputy Chief of Personnel and Division Commander. He was a committee member for the Massachusetts Human Resources Division in the development and implementation of the entry-level firefighters testing process.

Commissioner Finn earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from Northeastern University in 2008, graduating magna cum laude. He holds an Associate's Degree in Fire Science from Bunker Hill Community College.

Commissioner Finn served in the United States Marine Corps from 1979 to 1982.

In 2017, Commissioner Finn was the recipient of the prestigious Metro Fire Chief of the Year Award, presented by the Metropolitan Fire Chiefs Association.

Casey Sherman

Recipient of the Civil Responsibility Award



Casey Sherman is a renowned investigative journalist and multi-New York Times bestselling author of ten books, including *The Finest Hours*.

CWS is honoring Mr. Sherman for his generous support and work for individuals with disabilities.

In addition to *The Finest Hours*, Mr. Sherman has authored *Boston Strong*, which inspired the film, *Patriots Day*, the current NY Times Bestseller *12: The Inside Story of Tom Brady's Fight for Redemption* and *Above & Beyond: John F. Kennedy and the Cold War's Most Dangerous Spy Mission*.

Mr. Sherman received the Edward R. Murrow Award for journalistic excellence, the Truth & Justice Award from the Cold Case Institute of America, and is enshrined in the National Crime Museum for his work on the Boston Strangler case and the murder of his late aunt, Mary Sullivan.

Mr. Sherman is a Hyannis, Massachusetts, native. He attended Barnstable High School and graduated from Fryeburg Academy and then went on to graduate from Boston University.

Robert (Bob) Fawls Participant Award




Bob Fawls was a husband, father of 3 daughters, trusted neighbor, and friend to all, and a talented financial consultant. He was co-founder of Basis Point Group, LLC and served as the company's Managing Partner. Bob had more than 20 years of experience in Banks, Insurance Companies, Investment Management companies and pension funds. He served as Controller and Chief Financial Officer for Xerox in its Middle Eastern group. As a Senior Vice President for an investment analytic and portfolio management software company, Bob was trusted by many of the world's largest investment management firms to automate and streamline operations. As Vice President and General Manager for one of the largest financial services companies, he also led the development and enhancement of on-line trading and settlement products.

Bob was always willing to offer his expertise or knowledge in a given area and never passed up an opportunity to help solve a problem. He was driven to help those who were struggling and needed a break or simply provide some guidance. This is why he was drawn to CWS when he joined the Board of Directors in 2004. He was dedicated to his work with the organization and went on to become President of the Board of Directors in 2008, serving in that position until 2010.

He continued to serve as Vice Chair of the board from 2011 until his death in November of 2017. In 2013, he was awarded the Lord Camperdown Award for Outstanding Service to CWS. He took great pride in all that CWS achieved in serving individuals with different abilities and worked to ensure that the work of the organization could continue, grow and help others for years to come.

Erika Tarantal

MASTER OF CEREMONIES



Emmy Award winning journalist Erika Tarantal joined WCVB Channel 5 as an anchor and reporter for NewsCenter 5 in February 2014. Erika co-anchors WCVB's Midday news at noon. She is also a contributing reporter for WCVB's award-winning local news magazine, "Chronicle."

Erika comes to WCVB from News 4 New York, NBC's flagship station in New York City, where she anchored the weekend newscast and also was a primary fill-in co-anchor for WNBC's weekday morning newscast, "Today in New York." She has reported on major stories ranging from the death of Pope John Paul II and the election of Pope Benedict to hours of coverage during Superstorm Sandy and the tragic shootings in Newtown, CT.

Erika joined News 4 New York as a general assignment reporter in December 2007. Prior to joining NBC4, Erika served as a general assignment reporter at WVIT-TV in Hartford, CT beginning in October 2005. Prior to that, Erika rose through the ranks at News 12 in the Bronx where she started as a general assignment reporter before being promoted to anchor of the station's weekday morning newscast. Erika also served as a production assistant at WHDH-TV in Boston. Before beginning her career in broadcasting, Erika was a paralegal for the Office of the Attorney General in Boston.

Erika graduated from Connecticut College where she earned a bachelor's degree in government.

Tunefoolery

A Community of Music and Healing



Tunefoolery Music, Inc. is a unique, Boston-based non-profit organization for musicians in mental health recovery. Since 1994, it's been a community and a safe place where loving support, paid work, employment training, and music education create a foundation for healing and recovery.

Tunefoolery's mission is to empower its musicians while performing for people with little access to quality live music. Therefore, Tunefoolery's 60 musicians perform over 200 gigs every year (as solo acts or ensembles, playing everything from classical music to rock and jazz) at mental health centers, hospitals, conferences, shelters, etc., as well as for the general public.

To increase the level of professionalism, Tunefoolery also offers professional music lessons, workshops, recording sessions, and a yearly four-day retreat for its musicians. Another inspiring project is the Education Outreach program where musicians visit universities, schools, etc. educating students about mental health recovery, focusing on people's strengths and abilities rather than on the negative effects of mental illness. Since 2017, we also offer Music & Mindfulness groups for mental health communities in Massachusetts and beyond.

The healing process for people in mental health recovery can be a very painful journey where one's traumatic experiences and shortcomings often become the focus of the process. In Tunefoolery, music, creativity, purpose, and a loving community help transform people's lives and create a foundation to become productive, skilled musicians who can share the gift of music and hope with others.

Tunefoolery has collaborated with CWS around our youth program, Pathways. Tunefoolery's Executive Director, Jens Rybo, has attended several events, including our popular Connect2Careers. This event allows youth to conduct informational interviews with professionals in many different stages of their careers throughout a variety of different industries in the Boston area. A former Pathways participant also completed their internship at Tunefoolery, setting up and preparing a new computer lab and shadowing both staff and musicians to learn more about the day-to-day operations of the organization. CWS looks forward to future collaboration with Tunefoolery.





The Power Of Possible

Danielle McInnis



“I felt like I needed more. I needed a push. I needed to build my career more. So, I decided to start something new. And CWS helped make it happen!”

Not long ago, Danielle McInnis was working at Dunkin’ Donuts. She was struggling. “I didn’t have enough money to pay the bills. I didn’t have child care for my daughter. I just wasn’t making it.” Her family steered her to the MA Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) where agency staff told her she needed to be in school, training or in a job to qualify for financial assistance. She had a few choices about where to go to get help, but she chose CWS. “I found out CWS had hospitality training. I was interested in that.”

Danielle didn’t know just how much she would discover at CWS. “I had done maybe two interviews in my whole lifetime and I was scared. And I didn’t have a good resume.”

CWS helped Danielle with her resume. They helped her practice interviewing. “I practiced and practiced. Our teacher kept urging us to try to again, she wanted us to be our best.”

Danielle got an interview at Boston’s Boxer Hotel, renowned for its excellent customer service. “When I told my teacher I had an interview at that hotel, we spent one whole day just practicing my interview—every student interviewed me. When I got the job, I asked my general manager how I did in the interview. She said I did great!! I thank CWS for that.”

Last month, after a year and a half as a customer service representative, Danielle was promoted to front desk supervisor. It’s a big job. She loves it, and she’s really good at it. “I have more confidence. All my hard work has paid off. At CWS there’s more than one opportunity to choose what you want to do.”

Danielle keeps in touch with her friends at CWS. “I love the staff. I love, love, love my case manager! She’s amazing. I call her any time I need assistance or just someone to get me through a bumpy patch. They are there for me...and that matters a lot.”

The Power Of Possible

Donald Haynesworth



“I have a whole new life, a whole new energy. It’s a great feeling. CWS is allowing me to be the man I want to be, for me and for my child.”

Donald Haynesworth came to CWS after being incarcerated for 20 years. “I got caught up in a lifestyle that was comfortable, but it was dangerous. I knew I was the problem, and society tried to help me, but I wasn’t ready.”

Then, in prison, Donald had a personal reckoning. He was a young father. He rarely saw his son. “I started thinking...if I die, what happens? Who will foot the bill for my child? What’s my worth—not financially, but internally. Am I responsible? These things were important to me. When I came out of prison this time, I said, ‘I’m ready.’”

CWS was ready too.

Today, Donald works in the commercial cleaning sector at CWS. He is working on honing his skills to become an expert in carpet cleaning. He has aspirations to start his own business.

“CWS allows me to excel. I show up every day and try to be the best me I can be. The opportunities CWS give me are building my confidence. They trust me to do a good job because they know that I will never leave a job undone. When I am out in the community I am representing my crew, CWS and myself.”

“I will never be incarcerated again. My end game is to be successful. I have to be a role model for my child and for others who have been through what I’ve been through.”

The Power Of Possible

Lyanet Vasquez



“Being homeless is just not an excuse.”

Lyanet is an energetic 32-year old mother of six. She has her hands full, especially as a mom living in a homeless shelter. But she doesn’t let that stop her from pursuing her dreams.

Lyanet left high school at 17 when she became pregnant with her first child and the past 15 years have not been easy. “I was just a mom battling to make it every day. It’s not easy. Last year was an especially tough year. But then things started getting better.”

The shelter put Lyanet in touch with CWS. “When I came to CWS, I was expecting baby number six. I used the time I was pregnant to focus on finding a way to support my family. I came to CWS to study hospitality, and I graduated with my Customer Service Agent (CSA) certificate.”

Today, Lyanet works for WeWork in Boston. “I run a building that has 1600 people. I am the main Customer Service Agent and I work hard. I run one of the top 10 buildings in the Boston area.”

Lyanet is still living in the shelter, but she believes that will change very soon. “I am just now becoming financially stable. I am well trained and I know I will succeed in this career.”

Lyanet has many goals, but one stands out most of all: “I hope to be an example for my kids and for other moms who might be in my situation. CWS gave me the opportunity. I showed up and I am showing my kids the importance of not giving up. I am showing them that there is never an excuse, never a reason to stop trying.”

The Power Of Possible

Robert Sferrazza



“Yeah. It’s a slow process, and it isn’t perfect, but you have to start somewhere. And CWS is the place to start.”

Robert Sferrazza has never been afraid of hard work. He had a wife and children and a house—all the things that are supposed to add up to a happy life. But Robert’s life was anything but happy. “What got in my way was how I felt about myself. I turned to drugs to help me feel better about me. Then, I hurt my back and was prescribed opioids. That’s when things really went bad. I lost my job.

I lost my house. I lost my family. I lost myself. I really didn’t want to live anymore.”

Robert was in and out of detox and recovery. Nothing seemed to work. But then, Robert was referred to Community Work Services. “They gave me a case manager who asked what I wanted to do with my life. I had no answer. Over the years, I never really dealt with the feelings I had—love, pain, fear. I was a mess when I came to CWS. I really needed help, but I was brought up old school. You don’t ask for help. You don’t show your weaknesses. People have their own problems—they don’t want to deal with yours.”

The staff of CWS helped Robert see that it was OK to ask for help.

Today Robert credits CWS as the catalyst for a better life. He still has hard days, but he manages them better. “Here, at CWS, no one judges. Everyone just helps each other out—we are a team. They guided me in a million different ways. They helped me get clothes, doctors, therapists. They saw my work ethic. They believed in me.”

“Then they hired me full-time. Now I’m a supervisor in the training department. Now I get to give back. It’s awesome. I’m not one to brag, but I’ve come a long way. Community Work Services saved my life.”
